Talent Search Conducts Summer Enrichment Programs

Summer is often viewed as a total break from all things educational for students of today. However, **TRIO Educational Talent Search** (ETS) on its mission to assist youth in the positive development of their futures is working to the contrary. During the month of June, ETS conducted Summer Enrichment programs for its middle and high school participants. The events were attended by a total of eighty-six students.

Middle school enrichment was bursting with experiences that are sure to produce immeasurable benefits for participants. Activities began with Financial Literacy, Etiquette, and Public Speaking workshops presented by the Barbour County Extension Service followed by instruction in *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens* and ending with a remarkable trip to Atlanta. The program also integrated a series of purposeful writing lessons conducted via Skype by Ms. Karla Guilford of Tidewater Community College in Norfolk, Virginia. During these lessons, participants chose to compete in the "Patriot's Pen" competition sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) or the "Angela Award" sponsored by the National Science Teachers Association. In addition to entering national and local competitions, these students are also competing within Talent Search. The author of the winning essay, as determined by Ms. Guilford, will receive a Visa gift card.
