Wallace Community College is a public two-year college serving Barbour, Bullock, Coffee, Dale, Geneva, Henry, Houston, Pike, and Russell Counties and the contiguous counties in Georgia and northwest Florida. Classes are offered on two campuses—the Wallace Campus in Dothan and the Sparks Campus in Eufaula. In addition, the College provides skills training at correctional facilities in Clayton and Clio, Alabama. Programs in academics, allied health and nursing, and career and technical fields provide students with skillsets to build, advance, and change careers. Wallace Community College provides educational opportunities not only to the residents of local service areas, but to anyone with access to the Internet through numerous distance education courses.

The College also provides Adult Education and Workforce Development programs, which include courses in GED preparation, English as a Second Language, noncredit and continuing education short courses, and custom-designed short-term training for local businesses and industries. As a licensed WorkKeys® Service Center, Wallace Community College enables business and industry partners to match job opening requirements to the skills of job applicants.

# **Victory Flag Celebrations**



On October 30, 2013 and March 19, 2014, the College celebrated victories by raising Victory Flags at the flagpoles on both the Wallace and Sparks Campuses.

Lynn Lamere and the Dual Enrollment Program experienced an increase of 56% from Fall 2011 to Fall 2013

Wallace Community College had a 2.5% increase in our enrollment from Fall 2012 to Fall 2013.

Barbara Thompson and Angila Brannon recently won four awards at the Alabama Community College System Public Relations Association Conference. The awards included one Pyramid award for the Perspective newsletter, one Award of Achievement for the First Contact Brochure, and two Awards of Merit for the College Website and the student success story "WCC Sparks Auto Repair/Bomb Squad Vehicle."

Phi Theta Kappa on the Sparks Campus started a "Commit to Completion" mass pledge signing at the Sparks campus on September 11. At present 84 students have signed the pledge to earn a degree or certificate before they leave the community college for additional education or to enter the job market.

Joey Jackson, an instructor for the Welding Program on the Wallace Campus, passed the Certified Welding Inspector Exam. Mr. Jackson's achievement gives the College Certified Welding Inspectors at both the Sparks and Wallace campuses

A new 3D printer was gifted to Wallace Community College for the Industrial Systems Maintenance Technology program from the SoZo Group, a firm used by the City of Dothan to attract business and industry to Dothan and the surrounding Wiregrass Region. The \$10,000 3D printer will be used to train students on "Rapid Prototyping" of parts used in manufacturing, and students will get hands-on experience with the printer itself.

The Wallace Community College Foundation hosted its inaugural fundraiser, *An Evening in Little Italy*, on October 3, 2013. This fundraiser raised \$30,000 in profits that will be awarded in scholarships to deserving students on the Wallace Campus. Over 350 people attended the event.

On July 23 Wallace Community College Child Development Program partnered with Alabama Partnership for Children, Houston County Children's Policy Council, Alfred Saliba Center for Families, Yes We Can! Dothan, Troy University and the Wiregrass Foundation to provide a "Kindergarten Readiness" Professional Development activity for area child care centers. (

On August 24 the Child Development Program partnered with Family Guidance Center of Alabama and Alabama Cooperative Extension Agency of Houston County to present "Opening Doors for Children with Special Needs." The topics were Autism-Putting It into Perspective and Healthy Food and Games for Child Care Providers.

On April 22-23 the Child Development program partnered with Family Guidance Center of Alabama to present "The Learning Station" in celebration of "The Week of the Young Child."

From April through August, Child Development students on the Wallace campus completed over 268 hours for service learning activities.

During the fall semester students from the Sparks campus have been involved in numerous community partnerships with organizations whose focus is student and family improvement. They have worked with the Quitman County Head Start Program, ABC Day Care and Eufaula Carnegie Library, Eufaula/Barbour County Boys and Girls Club and Eufaula Primary School. The Child Development students are doing a wonderful job being actively involved in the local community.

During the summer semester the Sparks students participated in "Wonderful Wednesdays" with the Eufaula Carnegie Library. The Child Development program served over 105 children and adults by preparing and presenting age appropriate lessons on a variety of subjects throughout the months of June and July.

Heather Johnson-Walker, an accountant in the Business Office, works extremely hard on the accounting side of the grants for the College. We appreciate the extra behind the scenes work Heather does on behalf of the College and the many grants we have already received this year.

In May, Wallace Community College received \$15,000 from the American Association of Community Colleges for the Plus 50 Encore College Completion Program to assist adults age 50 and over update their skills or train for new jobs in health care, education, and social services. WCC is conducting a series of four seminars to help the Plus 50 population navigate a return to the classroom

In June the College received \$57,621 from the Alabama Department of Postsecondary, Career & Technical Education and Workforce Development Division for a Non-Traditional Model Program. This grant is designed to increase enrollment in programs in which there are male and female gender gaps. Through this grant the College has been able to update marketing and recruiting materials, commercial, and videos for non-traditional programs as well as purchase a web-based resource called Career Coach. This resource helps students locate data about area employment trends, current job postings, and local wages in non-traditional fields.

Our next victory flag celebration is for the grant for the Dual Enrollment Program. The program received \$58,000 from the Governor's Office of Workforce Development. This grant continues the existing Career Technical Dual Enrollment Program, which accelerates participants' college

careers. Scholarships for tuition, fees, and books are provided for qualifying high school students.

The Governor's Office of Workforce Development awarded the College \$40,000 for Ready to Work. Funds from this grant will be used to conduct a minimum of four (4) job readiness training classes at both the Dothan and Eufaula sites.

The College received \$31,500 from the Governor's Office of Workforce Development. This project will provide a career coach to act as liasion between the College and area high schools. The career coach helps high school students and adults define their career goals and recognize the educational and training opportunities available at WCC and other postsecondary programs

The Electrical Technology program received a Governor's Office of Workforce Development Grant for \$133,000. Funds for this project will purchase equipment to ensure the ENT program offers the most advanced training to Region 10's manufacturing and protective services sectors.

Wallace Community College will receive \$1.6 million from the US Department of Education over five years to increase excellence in student success in educational programs--specifically in the area of writing. The College will implement the Center for Writing and Writing Instruction on the Wallace and Sparks Campuses; WCC is the only college in Alabama receiving Title III funding and one of 33 colleges nationwide.

The 21st Century Workforce Initiative created partnerships with secondary career and technical programs. WCC partnered with area school systems to develop and expand career and technical education programs to address local workforce development needs. This partnership will help prepare students for employment and/or advancement in high-wage, high-demand occupations, or for entry into WCC's programs meeting the same needs. Partnerships forged through the initiative include: Dothan City Schools, Houston County Schools, Geneva County Schools, Henry County Schools, Barbour County Schools, and Enterprise City Schools.

The Public Relations and Marketing Department completed the WCC's Institutional Video for Community Groups. The video gives an overview of College programs including career technical, academic, and health science. Interviews with community and foundation leaders are set against Wallace and Sparks Campus locations and give viewers an overview of student life, including athletics. The purpose of the video is to emphasize to community groups the role of Wallace Community College in educating the Wiregrass.

For the fourth year, WCC has received the honor of being a Military Friendly School (2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014). Victory Media named *Wallace Community College* to the coveted Military Friendly Schools ® list. WCC is listed in the top 20% as doing the most to embrace America's military service members, veterans, and spouses as students and ensure their success on campus.

Wallace Community College experience an enrollment increase for spring semester 2014 over spring 2013. Currently, we have 4,406 students enrolled at WCC spring term.

The next certificate is being presented to the Mathematics and Computer Science Division to celebrate a successful 32nd Annual Math and Computer Science Olympiad. There were approximately 805 students representing 33 schools in Alabama, Georgia, and Florida competing in pre-algebra, algebra I, algebra II, geometry, advanced math, comprehensive, computer literacy, and microcomputer applications.

We would like to congratulate those Education Society members who received Innovation Grants. These grants are in the amount of \$1,500, are funded by the WCC and WCC Sparks

Campus Foundations and are designed to offer additional assistance for professional development activities, programs, equipment, etc.

This year's grants were awarded to: Ms. Paula Mims and Ms. Amy Greene, Business Technologies Instructors to purchase *QuickBooks* software site licenses for 50 computers for both campuses.

Mr. Jason Owen, Criminal Justice Instructor purchased "Rescue Randy", a 165-lb dummy, along with other necessary equipment for the physical agility portion of the Alabama Peace Officers Standards and Training Commission Physical Agility and Ability Examination.

Ms. Lori Hughes, ADN Instructor, attended the Nursing 2014 Symposium – The Conference for Clinical Excellence.

Ms. Traci Murph, Childcare Development Instructor used the grant for professional development training for Child Development Students Project. Sparks campus CHD students will attend up to four training sessions sponsored by the Department of Children's Affairs and the Office of School Readiness.

The Criminal Justice Program on Wallace campus purchased a force simulator for student and local law enforcement use. This simulator is state of the art, consisting of five screens and 300-degree view. Each scenario takes students through real-life based situations challenging students to make split second decisions in a controlled environment enforcing critical thinking, communication, and articulation skills. This state of the art simulator is the third one in the state, and the first in the Alabama Community College System. Since it's installation on February 21, approximately 100 students, faculty and local law enforcement have experienced this use of force simulator.

Congratulations to the Emergency Medical Services Department for their reaccreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs upon the recommendation of the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions.

The next three certificates will be presented to our Practical Nursing department for board scores.

- The first for achieving a 96.3% passage rate, exceeding both state and national totals by 5% and 11.6%, respectively for first-time test takers on the National Council Licensure Exam for the 2012-2013 Alabama Board of Nursing Fiscal Year.
- The second recognizes the program for the highest number of candidates taking the National Council Exam in the State of Alabama. There were 107 first-time test takers, with 103 passing on their first attempt.
- And the final certificate recognizes the program for the three-year mean passage rate, exceeding the national mean by 12.7% for first-time test-takers on the National Council Licensure Exam.

We want to recognize the Associate Degree Nursing program for an 84.2% pass rate for first-time test takers which is above the national standard for first-time test takers.

Our next certificate recognizes Vanessa Dickens who was presented The Spirit of Tullibody Award at the 114<sup>th</sup> Founders Day Convocation by Alabama State University President Dr. Gwendolyn Boyd. This award recognizes alumnus who have made notable professional and civic contributions to the community in which they live and to Alabama State University.

The Child Development students have collected over 100 books to donate to area child care centers.

A partnership between Child Development and Family Guidance Center of Alabama Dothan presented a workshop entitled "Sensational Saturday." The workshop was presented by Mr. David Kisor, who is an accomplished children's song writer, speaker, motivator and educator. He also represented "Growing Sound," which was developed to create music and other products that translate key findings from recent Child Development research.

#### **HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE**

In 1949, George C. Wallace State Technical Trade School was established by the Alabama Regional Trade School Act of 1947. In 1955, the name of the institution was changed to George C. Wallace State Vocational Trade School, and on May 3, 1963, by decree of the Alabama State Legislature, the institution became George C. Wallace State Technical Junior College. In response to a recommendation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), the technical school and junior college were united in 1969 to form south Alabama's first comprehensive community college. The Commission on Colleges of SACS accredited George C. Wallace State Community College to award associate degrees and certificates in 1969, and accreditation was reaffirmed in 1973, 1984, and 1994. On November 12, 1996, the name of the institution was changed to George C. Wallace Community College, and the College was reaffirmed for accreditation in 2002 and 2012.

The 1997 merger between Wallace Community College and Alabama Aviation and Technical College in Ozark and Mobile was followed in 1999 by the merger of Wallace Community College and Sparks State Technical College in Eufaula. In 2003, the Aviation Campus in Ozark and Aviation Center in Mobile merged with a local junior college to enable it to become a community college. Wallace Community College now includes the Wallace Campus in Dothan and the Sparks Campus in Eufaula. Wallace Community College also provides educational programs at Easterling Correctional Facility in Clio, Alabama, and Ventress Correctional Facility in Clayton, Alabama.

Dr. Linda C. Young 1999-present Dr. Linda C. Young is very proud that she is a product of Alabama's Community College System. She began her college work at Enterprise State Junior College (ESJC) after graduating as valedictorian of her class at Elba High School. She received an associate in arts degree from ESJC, both her bachelor's and master's degrees from Troy University, and a doctorate from Auburn University.

Dr. Young taught three years in K-12, and the remainder of her work has been in Alabama's Community College System. She worked at Enterprise State Junior College in a variety of jobs, the Department of Postsecondary Education as Executive Assistant to the Chancellor, and Lurleen B. Wallace Junior College in Andalusia as Dean of Academic Affairs. In 1988, she was appointed President of Sparks State Technical College in Eufaula. With that appointment, she became the first female to head a technical college in Alabama. In 1999, Sparks was merged with George C. Wallace Community College-Dothan, and Dr. Young was appointed President of the newly merged institution. Wallace Community College has instructional sites in Dothan, Eufaula, and two prisons in Barbour County.

Dr. Young has served in a variety of civic organizations and professional associations over the years. She served as the 2008-09 Chair of the Dothan Area Chamber of Commerce and has served on the Executive Committee and Board of Directors. She is also a past steering committee member for ENVISION, an area strategic planning process. She is a past president of the Eufaula/Barbour County Chamber of Commerce and the Greater Barbour County United Way. Governor Bob Riley appointed her to his Education Spending Commission and to the Alabama Workforce Planning Council. Appointed by the Chancellor, Dr. Young served as a member of the Presidential Evaluation Process Review Committee. She currently serves on the Joint Task Force on Correctional Education and chairs the Workforce Development/ATN Subcommittee for State Board policy review.

Dr. Young is a 1999 graduate of the Leadership Alabama program. She is a member of the Dothan Rotary Club, the Fort Rucker-Wiregrass Chapter of the Association of the United States Army (AUSA), the Alabama Technology Network—Eufaula Center Board of Advisors, Flowers Hospital Board, Leadership Alabama Board of Directors, Accelerate Alabama Steering Committee, Ozark-Dale County Economic Development Corporation, and Wiregrass Forum. Dr. Young was named a Paul Harris Fellow by the Eufaula Rotary Club in 2001. Dr. Young was honored in 2013 by the American Association of Community Colleges for 25 years of service as a college president.







# Full-Time Faculty Member Age Distribution








# ENROLLMENT BY RECORDED PROGRAM AND AREA FALL 2013



### DISTRIBUTION OF GRADES - Fall 2013 (All College Locations)






### 2013-2014 COSMETOLOGY CERTIFICATION/LICENSURE PERFORMANCE CUMULATIVE TOTALS





# 2013-2014 COSMETOLOGY CERTIFICATION/LICENSURE PERFORMANCE CUMULATIVE TOTALS





#### **Wallace Community College Library**

The Learning Resources Centers (LRC) System provides various resources for students and faculty and staff members to support college programs and lifelong learning. LRC System services are provided at all instructional locations. Learning Resources Centers are located on the Wallace Campus in Dothan and the Sparks Campus in Eufaula.

The LRC System provides resources in various formats for faculty members and students at all college locations. Access to LRC resources is available through the College Web-based online public access catalog. The Alabama Virtual Library (AVL), a state-supported Web site of essential periodical and information resources, is also accessible online. The LRC System provides access to approximately 50,000 e-books through the EBSCO E-books database. The Alabama Virtual Library, the Wallace Community College Library Catalog, Bloom's Literature Reference Collection, Congressional Digest Debates Online, EBSCO E-books, JSTOR Collection, Lexis Nexis, OVID Nursing Collection, ProQuest Nursing and Allied Health Source, and Salem Press Reference Collection are accessible at remote locations for college patrons through the Wallace Community College website. The LRC also provides basic reference sources, print periodicals, and various other resources. These resources are available to all students, including those participating in distance learning. In addition, the LRC System participates in interlibrary loan services and cooperative agreements with area libraries.

The LRC System houses a collection of approximately 42,000 bound volumes, 1,200 media resources, and 160 print periodicals as well as computers with Internet access. Special collections on the Wallace Campus include the Teacher's Collection, the Children's Book Collection, and an Alabama Collection.

Identification cards are required to check out materials and may be obtained at the circulation desks. Also, Alabama Virtual Library (AVL) cards, which provide home access to the AVL, are available for students and the faculty and staff. Students participate in an orientation program designed to assist them in using LRC resources to enhance learning and research opportunities. In addition, a Research Skills class is taught by the librarians at the request of individual instructors. Computers, printers, photocopiers, and viewing/listening centers are available for patron use.
