DISABILITY SUPPORT SERVICES (DSS)

Disability Support Services provides reasonable accommodations and services for qualified students with documented disabilities.

What is a disability? What does DSS do?

The Americans with Disabilities Act, 1990, defines a disability as a “mental or physical impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities.” Walking, eating, talking, breathing, writing, listening, and learning are examples of major life activities. If you have a documented impairment, you may be entitled to certain accommodations under the ADA.

What are “reasonable accommodations and services”?

Reasonable accommodations and services may include priority registration, extra time on tests, special seating arrangements, assistance with class notes, and/or alternate format materials (such as tape recorders, large print, or other adaptive technology) which meet the individual needs of the person with the disability.

Admission and Financial Aid Tips

- Starting early is key! This ensures that all paperwork and financial aid are in place in time for registration.
- Complete an Application for Admission online or by submitting to any Student Affairs location.
- Provide appropriate identification documents to validate citizenship.
- Request transcripts/GED scores from all schools previously attended.
- Ensure that the Admissions and Financial Aid offices have your most current mailing address.
- Check your College e-mail regularly for important announcements.
- Sign and return Admission Agreement, indicating admission status, and provide any other requested documents.
- File early for financial aid! You may apply for federal assistance online by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The College financial aid code is **001018**.
- Check the College Web site at www.wallace.edu for scholarship information.
- Respond promptly to all correspondence from the Financial Aid Office. Do not wait until registration to finalize your financial aid. It should be complete before you register for classes.
- Take your placement exam prior to registration.
- Attend scheduled Student Orientation, Advising, and Registration (SOAR) session; meet with your advisor and register for classes.
- Pay tuition by appropriate deadline.

Placement and Challenge Exam Procedures

According to Alabama State Board of Education Policy 802.1, students may challenge English, math, and/or reading ASSET®/COMPASS™ placement scores by retesting one time only if first scores are unsatisfactory. A fee of \$8 is charged to retake COMPASS™.

A CIS 146 challenge exam is also available. Contact Mr. David Cruz-Wells at 334-556-2255, 1-800-543-2426 (Ext. 2255), or e-mail dcruzwells@wallace.edu. No more than 10 applicants per test are allowed for this challenge exam. Students should be on time. No one will be tested after 15 minutes into the test. Contact Mr. Cruz-Wells 24 hours prior to testing to allow time for scheduling and resource allocation.

The Alabama Community College System Biology Placement Exam is available for students who desire to exempt BIO 103, which is the prerequisite for BIO 201—Anatomy and Physiology I and BIO 220—General Microbiology. A fee of \$26.25 is required at registration, prior to biology placement testing. Students may not retest.

Payment forms must be processed in the Business Office or appropriate designated office on each campus. Students must bring a receipt and a federal or state photo identification to the Test Center. For Test Center hours, contact the Wallace Campus at 334-983-3521 (Ext. 2208, 2281, and 2294) or the Sparks Campus at 334-687-3543 (Ext. 4210).

Technology-Based Instruction

Information About Online and Hybrid Classes

Wallace Community College uses Blackboard® to support its online instructional programs. This technology provides students with an opportunity to pursue courses in formats that meet all course requirements while reducing in-class time. Faculty members are able to post course syllabi, contact information, and course content and ensure that students are aware of online activities that require participation, such as communicating with the instructor and other students, completing online assignments and quizzes, and posting course grades. Students must be aware of the requirements for each course in which they are enrolled.

Online and Hybrid Courses with On-Campus Labs

The Internet is used to deliver instruction in the following courses:

- Online courses are delivered over the Internet using Blackboard®. These courses will require the student's physical presence on campus to complete selected exams.
- Hybrid courses with on-campus meetings meet online for a portion of the course meetings. Students are required to attend scheduled on-campus sessions at the designated campus.
- Online and hybrid courses require use of the Blackboard® system. Students can access the Blackboard® system at courses.wallace.edu.

Requirements and Assistance for Online and Hybrid Courses

Wallace Community College offers many classes that reduce the amount of time students must physically be on campus. These online and hybrid classes are indicated by “N” or “H” in the section number. While online classes do not require weekly meetings, they do require students to complete mid-term and final exams on campus under the direct supervision of the instructor. Hybrid classes require students to attend weekly on-campus meetings throughout the semester. Wallace Community College does not offer classes that are entirely online.

Students interested in taking online or hybrid classes should carefully consider their learning styles. These classes require students to be self-motivated and able to complete assignments with minimal supervision. Students should also possess strong computer skills. The eLearning training will help ensure that students are ready for online courses. The eLearning training is highly recommended for all students, even those not taking online courses.

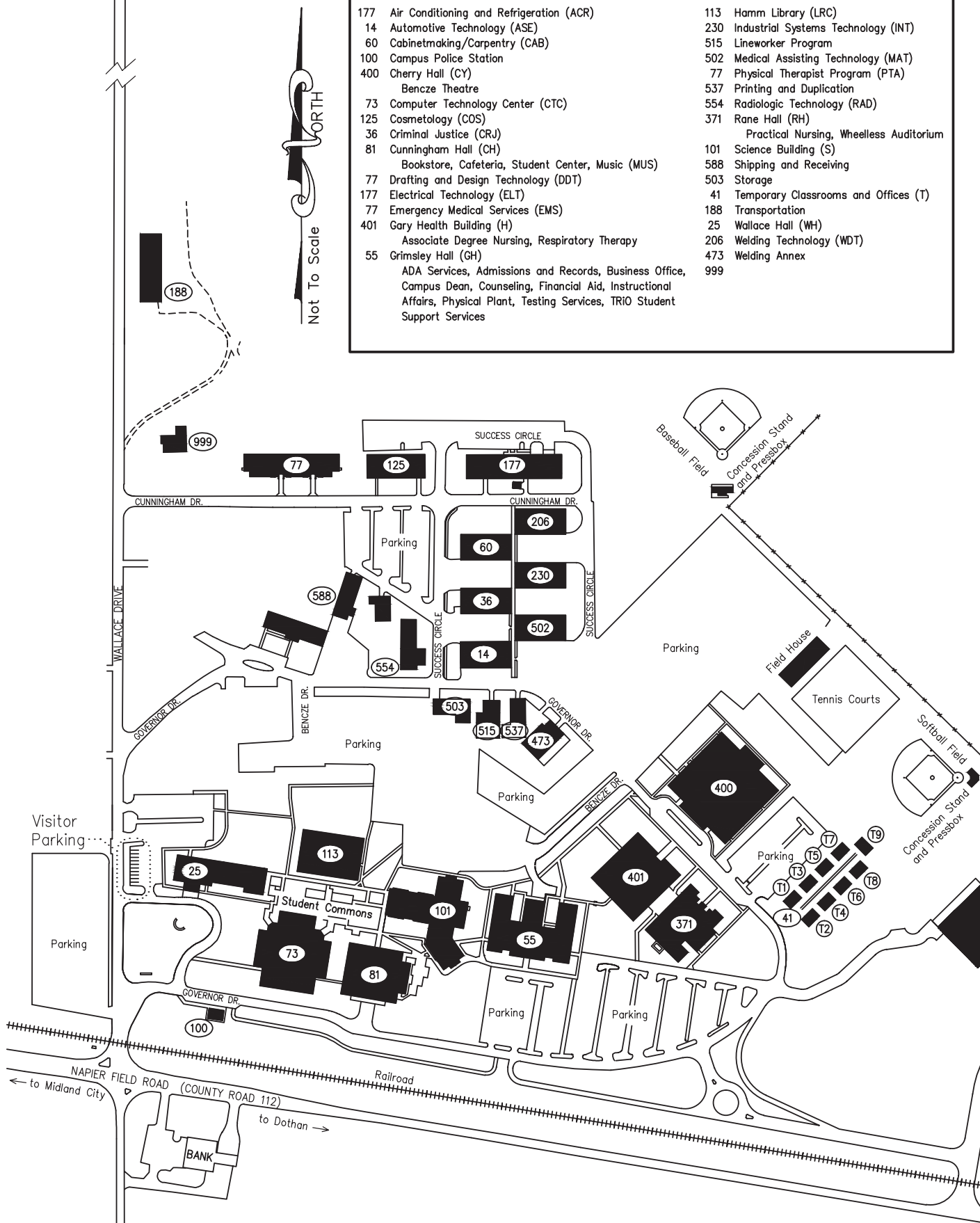

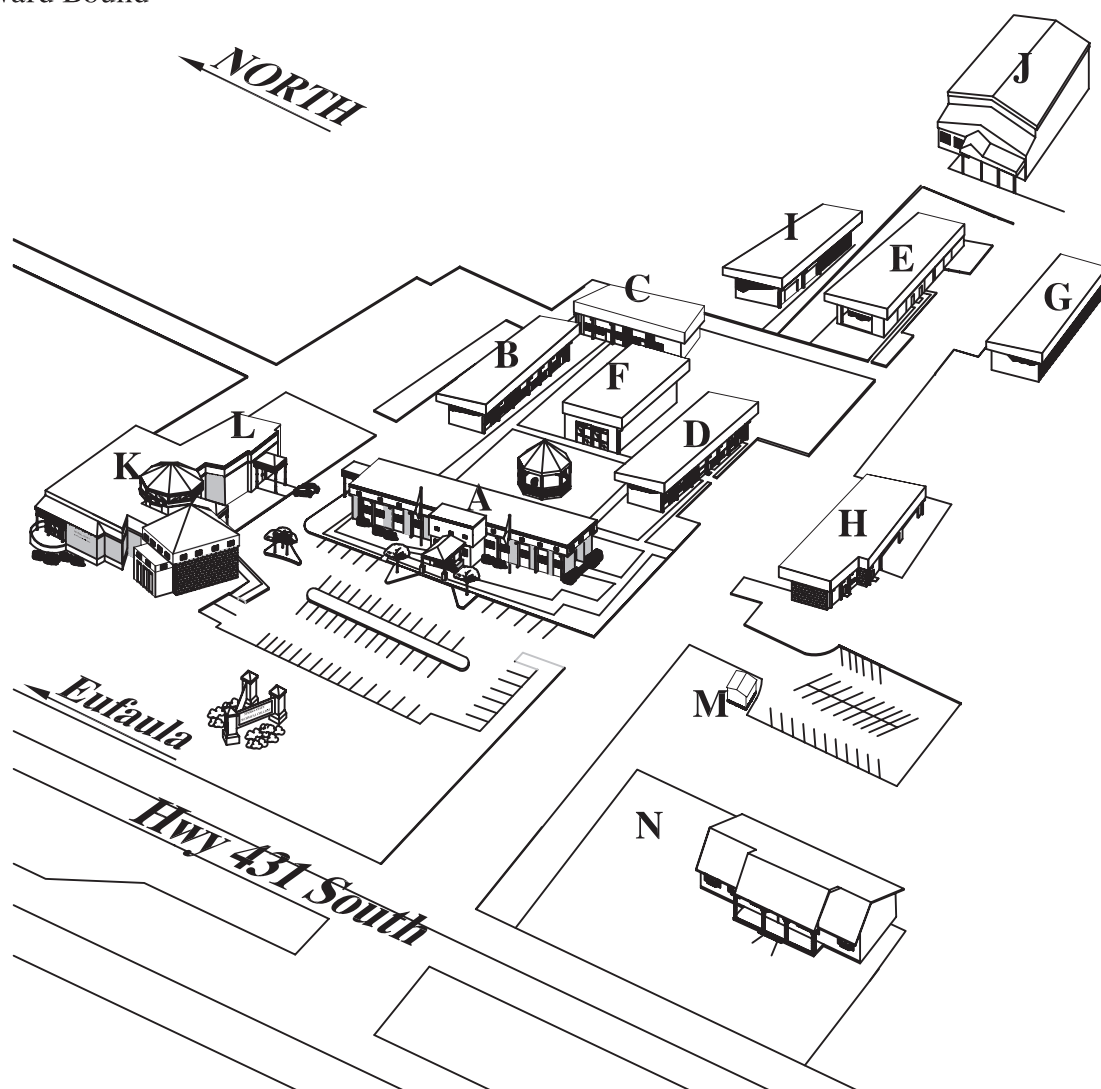

Workforce Development Classes

CERTIFIED DIETARY MANAGER

Become a trained dietary manager who supervises kitchen operation services in long-term care facilities, hospitals, schools, correctional institutions, and other noncommercial food service settings. This 20-week course is offered through the Association of Nutrition and Food Service Professionals (ANFP). Classes meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 5:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. Tuition and fees (including books and the national exam) are \$1,995. A minimum of five students is required. Prerequisites include a two-step TB skin test along with a complete background check. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission. WIA approved.

CERTIFIED NURSE ASSISTANT (CNA)

An ongoing need exists for certified nurse assistants in the region. This 20-day course prepares students for the state Nurse Aid Registry exam. Classes meet Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Tuition and fees (including books and the nurse aide registry exam) are \$725. A minimum of seven students is required. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission. WIA approved.

COMPUTER SKILLS FOR TODAY'S WORKPLACE

This six-week program will help students develop computer skills to work in an office environment. Skills range from basic use and keyboarding to proficiency in Microsoft® Excel®, PowerPoint®, and Word®. Classes meet on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evenings from 5:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. Tuition and fees (includes books) are \$1,500. A minimum of four students is required. WIA approved.

PREAPPRENTICE ELECTRICAL LINEMAN TRAINING

Develop skills to work in the electrical distribution industry by becoming a lineworker. This seven-week course will prepare students in pole climbing, CDL training, electrical theory, line make-ups, interpersonal skills, interview techniques, and much more. Classes meet Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Tuition and fees (including books, use of tools, and personal protective equipment) are \$3,500. A minimum of eight students is required. Prerequisites include a Department of Transportation (DOT) physical examination and a two-year driving record from the state troopers' office. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission. WIA approved.

OPHTHALMIC ASSISTANT

Develop skills to assist an ophthalmologist or an optometrist in an eye-care facility. This 14-week training course could be the starting point for a new career in the health care field. Classes meet on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6:00 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. Tuition and fees (includes books) are \$1,400. A minimum of six students is required. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission. WIA approved.

PROFESSIONAL MEDICAL CODING

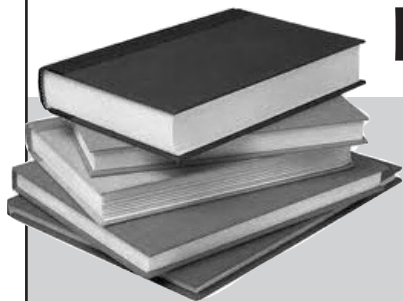
This 20-week course prepares students to take the AAPC coding exam. Classes meet on Tuesday evenings from 5:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. Tuition and fees (including books, AAPC student membership, and national exam) are \$1,400. A minimum of ten students is required. Prerequisites include proof of taking Human Anatomy and Medical Terminology courses. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission. WIA approved.

PLUMBERS APPRENTICE COURSE

Develop plumbing skills for entry into the plumbing field through this eight-month short course. The certified curriculum will be delivered in three, 16-week modules in conjunction with the State of Alabama Plumbing and Gas Fitters Board. Learn plastic, copper, cast-iron, carbon, stainless, and carbon steel piping and fittings as well as fixtures, faucets, water distribution systems, and plumbing codes used in the plumbing profession. Classes meet on Tuesday evenings from 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. Tuition and fees (including books and supplies) are \$500 per module or \$1,500 for all three modules. A minimum of eight students is required. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission. WIA approved.

READY TO WORK (RTW)

Ready To Work is an eight-week, employer-designed course that provides trainees with entry-level skills required for employment with most industries and businesses in Alabama. The training focuses on basic education (applied math, reading and locating information, and communication skills), computer skills (Microsoft® Excel®, Windows 7®, and Word®), problem-solving, workplace behavior, manufacturing (precision measurement, safety), and job acquisition skills. Those achieving successful test scores will receive an Alabama Career Readiness Certificate along with an Alabama Certified Worker certificate. Classes meet at varying times depending on campus location. This course is free to the public. A minimum of five students is required. High school diploma or equivalent required for admission.

In compliance with the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HR 4137) Section 112 - Textbook Information, Wallace Community College now provides access to textbook pricing information in the online course schedule at the following link: www.wallace.edu/ocs. Simply select the appropriate course(s) and click “submit.” A display window will appear with the selected courses listed. Textbook information is available by clicking the “view” link in the “Book” column. No password is required.

WCC online has been retooled and is now named **myWCC**.



The **STUDENT INFORMATION CENTER (myWCC)** is an online information resource through which students can apply for College services, track the status of College admissions/records and financial aid files, register for classes, check grades, print unofficial transcripts, print degree plans, check financial aid status, check their e-mails, and much more. Students are encouraged to monitor their accounts to be sure required documents are submitted **before** registration. Submission of all required documents will expedite the registration process and in most cases will eliminate the requirement for students to visit the campus and wait in long lines. Students who do not have Internet access in their homes may use computers on campus to take advantage of the features available through myWCC.

To access myWCC, log on to the Wallace Community College Web site, www.wallace.edu, and follow the steps below:

1. Click on the Quick Links tab.
2. Click myWCC.
3. Click LOGIN at the top of the screen.
4. Enter User ID and PIN. The default User ID and PIN number is your Social Security number and date of birth (six digits).

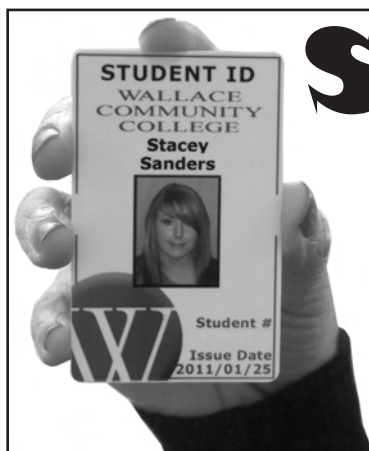

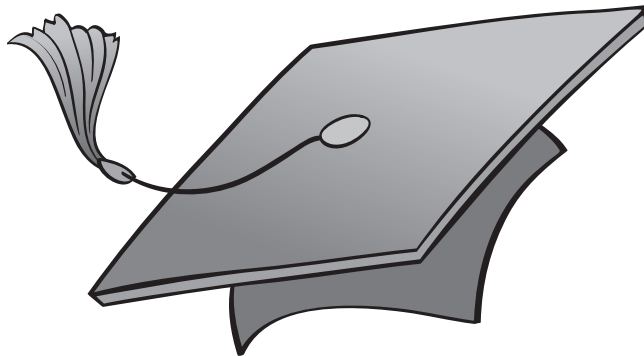

- Faculty members teaching courses that do not follow the standard day/time scheduling scheme will determine test dates and times within the testing period that best complement the standard schedule.
- Faculty members in technical, nursing, and allied health programs whose courses combine theory, lab, and clinical meetings should use the theory meeting time to schedule their final exams.
- Faculty members teaching distance education classes and those who offer traditional course final exams via Wallace Online will make arrangements for computer labs for their exams.

Computer Lab Printing Policy

Prepaid print cards are required to print in Wallace Community College computer labs. Five- and ten-dollar cards are available in the Bookstore on the Wallace and Sparks Campuses.

To print, enter the code listed on the print card into the print limit interface on lab computers. The account is loaded automatically upon logging in with a username and password. Students will be able to view their print limit account from any lab computer.

Got Pell for Summer 2012?

If you have used Pell for the 2011-12 year and are unsure how to answer this question, you can access NSLDS to find out if you have funds remaining for summer. The National Student Loan Data System (NSLDS) is the U.S. Department of Education's central database for student aid. NSLDS receives data from schools, guaranty agencies, the Direct Loan program, and other Department of Education programs. NSLDS Student Access provides a centralized, integrated view of Title IV loans and grants so that recipients of Title IV Aid can access and inquire about their Title IV loans and/or grant data. To find out if you have Pell funds remaining for summer 2012, please use the following instructions to access NSLDS:

The National Student Loan Data System (NSLDS)

1. Obtain a Personal Identification Number (PIN) from the U.S. Department of Education at www.pin.ed.gov or have the PIN that was used when you applied for your FAFSA. This PIN serves as your electronic signature and provides access to your personal records with the U.S. Department of Education systems.
2. Access NSLDS by going to www.nslds.ed.gov. On the NSLDS screen, click on **Financial Aid Review**.
3. Read the privacy statement on this screen. If you agree, click **ACCEPT**. A security configuration question may or may not prompt, depending on your browser's current security configuration. If you are comfortable with your browser's current security configuration, click **ACCEPT** to continue. The **CONFIRMING YOUR IDENTITY** screen will appear after you click **ACCEPT**.
4. Enter your Social Security number (SSN), the first two letters of your last name, your date of birth, and your PIN to confirm your identity. **Keep your PIN safe and secure.**
5. Click on the **blue number** to the left of Award Year 2011-2012.
6. In the **Amounts and Dates** section, view **Remaining Amount to be Paid**. *If remaining amount is greater than \$0, then you may have remaining Pell Grant for summer 2012.*
 - **Certain exceptions and conditions apply**, such as financial aid warning, financial aid suspension, or new issues with satisfactory academic progress.
 - Keep in mind that your remaining balance for summer 2012 will be dependent upon your class registration (number of credit hours, Title IV hours, or remaining clock hours, etc.).
 - Under no circumstances will your summer 2012 Pell award exceed 50% of the **Scheduled Amount** shown on this NSLDS inquiry.
7. Be sure to **LOGOFF** when your review is complete.

2012-2013 Important Financial Aid Changes

Pell Grant Lifetime Eligibility Notice

The U.S. Department of Education recently established new regulations which reduce the duration of a student's lifetime eligibility to receive Pell Grant from 18 full-time semesters (or its equivalent) to 12 full-time semesters (or its equivalent). This provision applies to all Federal Pell Grant eligible students effective 2012-13.

What does this mean to you?

An eligible student can receive the Federal Pell Grant until the earliest of a bachelors degree or until the student has received the Federal Pell Grant for an equivalent of 12 full-time semesters. This limitation includes the percentage of Federal Pell Grant the student has received from **all** post-secondary institutions regardless of when the student began receiving aid. Since receipt of a full Federal Pell Grant annual award is equivalent to 100% (based on two (50%) full-time semesters per award year), 12 full-time semesters equates to 600%. The following is applicable to Wallace Community College:

- Each full-time semester (12 or more credits) that the student receives the Federal Pell Grant represents 50% of an annual award.
- Each three-quarter semester (9 to 11 credits) that the student receives the Federal Pell Grant represents 37.5 % of an annual award.
- Each half-time semester (6 to 8 credits) that the student receives the Federal Pell Grant represents 25% of an annual award.
- Each part-time semester (1 to 5 credits) that the student receives the Federal Pell Grant represents 12.5% of an annual award.

In mid-April, the U.S. Department of Education will begin sending e-mail messages to all 2012-13 FAFSA applicants who appear to be Pell Grant eligible and are in excess of 450% of their Pell Grant lifetime eligibility. This process will be repeated weekly until July for FAFSA filers and for filers making corrections to their FAFSA information.

Tracking Your Lifetime Eligibility Used on NSLDS

You can find your *Lifetime Eligibility Used* for the Federal Pell Grant by going to the web site www.nsls.ed.gov and creating a student account. The National Student Loan Data System (NSLDS) is the U.S. Department of Education's (ED's) central database for student aid. NSLDS receives data from schools, guaranty agencies, the Direct Loan program, and other Department of ED programs. NSLDS Student Access provides a centralized, integrated view of Title IV loans and grants so that recipients of Title IV Aid can access and inquire about their Title IV loans and/or grant data.

security configuration, click **Accept** to continue. The **Confirming Your Identity** screen will appear after you click **Accept**.

- Step 4: Enter your **Social Security** number (SSN), *the first two letters of your last name*, your *date of birth*, and your *PIN* to confirm your identity. **Keep your PIN safe and secure.**
- Step 5: View the **Financial Aid Review** screen listing your total **Lifetime Eligibility Used**. If this amount equals 600% or more, you have no remaining eligibility for Pell Grant.
- Step 6: Be sure to **LOG OFF** when your review is complete.

Ability to Benefit

Students who do not have a high school diploma or a recognized equivalent (GED), or do not meet the home school requirements, and who first enroll in a program of study on or after July 1, 2012, **will not** be eligible to receive Title IV student aid.

New Verification Requirements

The U.S. Department of Education has instituted some changes to the verification process for the 2012-13 award year. According to the U.S. Department of Education Dear Colleague Letter GEN 11-03:

Since most applicants can quickly and easily access IRS data through the FAFSA-IRS Data Retrieval process, we no longer consider it reasonable for an institution to accept anything less reliable than IRS-supplied evidence for verification of income data. Therefore, if an applicant selected for verification has not successfully transferred information from the IRS, or transferred the information but then changed it, the Department will expect the institution to require the applicant, and if necessary the applicant's parents, to provide an official IRS transcript of their Federal income tax information..

What This Means

Students and parents can no longer submit a signed copy of their Federal tax returns as a means of confirming the income reported on the FAFSA. When

completing the income sections of the FAFSA, the applicant is given the option to have this data retrieved directly from the IRS at the time of FAFSA Completion.

If applicants decide not to use the IRS data retrieval process and the application is selected for verification, the applicant and the parents will be required to submit an IRS Tax Transcript.

If the IRS tax retrieved information is changed on the FAFSA, the applicant will be required to submit an IRS Tax Transcript.

However, the IRS data can be retrieved by the applicant when a correction is made to the FAFSA. If the retrieved data is not changed, then an IRS Tax Transcript will not be required.

The IRS Data Retrieval process began on February 5, 2012. In order to determine if the applicant is eligible to use the retrieval process, the applicant must have a 2011 tax return on file with the IRS at the time of FAFSA Completion.

Tax Filers with Special Circumstances

The IRS Tax Retrieval may not be available for the applicant in the following circumstances:

- A joint tax return was filed for 2011 and the student or the student's parents have filed the FAFSA with a marital status of separated, divorced, or widowed.
- If the tax filer is married to someone other than the individual included on the 2011 joint tax return.
- If the parent or student was not married in 2011 but is married at the time the FAFSA is filed. The current spouse's income must be reported on the FAFSA.
- If the parents or the student is married but filed tax returns separately.
- If an amended tax return was filed.

Requesting an IRS Tax Transcript

This can be done free of charge from the IRS one of three ways.

Online Request

- Available on the IRS website at www.irs.gov.
- In the Tools section of the homepage click “Order a Return or Account Transcript.”
- Enter the tax filer’s social security number, date of birth, street address, and zip or postal code. Use the address currently on file with the IRS. Generally, this will be the address that was listed on the latest tax return filed.
- In the Type of Transcript field, select “Tax Return Transcript” and in the Tax Year field, select “2011.”
- If successfully validated, tax filers can expect to receive a paper IRS tax return transcript at the address included in their online request, within 5 to 10 days from the time the online request was successfully transmitted to the IRS.

Telephone Request

- Available from the IRS by calling 1-800-908-9946.
- Tax filers must follow prompts to enter their social security number and the numbers in their street address. Generally this will be numbers of the street address that was listed on the latest tax return filed.
- Select “Option 2” to request an IRS tax return transcript and then enter “2011.”
- If successfully validated, tax filer can expect to receive a paper IRS tax return transcript at the address that was used in their telephone request within 5 to 10 days from the time the IRS receives the request.

Paper Request Form – IRS Form 4506T-EZ

- Use IRS Form 4506T-EZ.
- Download at www.irs.gov.
- Complete lines 1 – 4, following the instructions on page 2 of the form.

- Note that line 3 should be the most current address as filed with the IRS – it is the address where the IRS Tax Return Transcript will be sent.
- If the address has recently changed, include the address listed on the latest tax return filed on Line 4.
- The tax filers (or spouse if requesting information from a joint tax return) must sign and date the form and enter their telephone number. Only one signature is required to request a transcript for a joint return.
- Mail or fax the completed IRS Form 4506T-EZ to the appropriate address (or FAX number) provided on page 2 of Form 4506T-EZ.
- Tax filers can expect to receive their transcript within 5 to 10 days from the time the IRS receives and processes their signed request. NOTE: Processing form 4506T-EZ means verifying/validating the information provided on the form. If any information does not match the IRS records, the IRS will notify the tax filer that it was not able to provide the transcript.

Nontax Filers Selected for Verification

For an individual that has not filed and, under IRS rules is not required to file an income tax return, a copy of IRS Form W-2 for each source of employment income received in tax year 2011 must be provided.

Qualifying Income for Automatic Zero EFC Reduced

Qualifying income for the Automatic Zero EFC determination has been reduced to \$23,000 from the current \$30,000 beginning with award year 2012-13. Auto-zero applies only to EFC calculations for dependent students (based on parent income) and independent students with dependents other than a spouse (based on the combined income of the student and spouse).
