

TALENT SEARCH NEWS

TRiO Educational Talent Search (ETS) on the Sparks Campus has not let the conclusion of the school year leave its participants idle. Two weeks of the month of June were filled with enrichment activities which were offered to all Talent Search participants entering grades 7-12 in the fall. The event was attended by 81 middle school and high school students.

During the middle school enrichment week, participants learned lessons that would be beneficial for the remainder of their school years as well as some that will continue to be useful throughout their personal and professional lives. The week began with a "Write Right" workshop during which participants learned to generate and organize thoughts for writing. The students also acquired a bit of financial knowledge using the FDIC Money Smarts curriculum and participated in team building exercises.

High school participants began their week with the "Get Your Money WRITE" session which consisted of writing lessons pertaining to scholarship essays. Many students began completing the application for the Gates Millennium Scholarship (GMS) during this time. As part of the mission of getting more students to receive scholarships, Gates Millennium Scholar and Upward Bound instructor Ms. Tameka Hicks shared her story of earning the GMS and mentored students on academic success and the scholarship application process. Ms. Lynn Lamere (Dual Enrollment Coordinator) informed the group of educational opportunities available through dual enrollment, and students received instruction on linking high school and college courses with career interests.

One of the highlights of middle school and high school Summer Enrichment was community service. Prior to attending Summer Enrichment, students received letters asking them to bring certain nonperishable food items to donate to the Back Pack Program. During Summer Enrichment, they participated in workshops on the importance of involving themselves in community service for scholarship purposes and for self-fulfillment. Students were also given tools and instruction to document community service. At the end of the week, ETS participants were visited by Ms. Carol Rich (Math Instructor at WCC) who is a coordinator for one of the local Back Pack Programs. Ms. Rich explained to students that a local teacher noticed a young child coming to school unusually hungry on Monday mornings and mentioned it to her and some others. They began to pack the child's book bag with food on Friday afternoons. They soon began to wonder how many other children were in similar situations. Presently, twelve children have been identified and are being served by this program. Ms. Rich informed ETS participants that the amount of food collected during Summer Enrichment would keep those twelve children from being hungry during the week-end for over a month.

In addition to other activities, both middle school and high school students participated in industry tours. Middle school participants learned lessons about electricity production and received first-hand career information from employees while visiting the Joseph M. Farley Nuclear Plant in Columbia, AL. High school participants were enlightened on the poultry industry while discovering the wide-range of careers in the business directly from degree-holding employees at Keystone Foods in Eufaula. All attendees toured Wallace Community College - Sparks Campus as a part of Summer Enrichment 2014.

Although the academic year has ended (or has yet to begin) for most students, Educational Talent Search participants can expect opportunities for educational enrichment and career discovery at any time.


