Talent Search Summer Enrichment

TRiO Educational Talent Search (ETS) on the Sparks Campus has not allowed the conclusion of the school year to leave its participants idle. Two weeks during the month of June were filled with enrichment activities for all Talent search participants entering grades 7-12.

During the middle school enrichment week, participants learned lessons that will be beneficial for the rest of their school years as well as some that will continue to be useful throughout their lives. Mr. Derek Crawford, Wallace Engineering Graphics and Animation instructor, served as a mentor to the students sharing his personal and professional story. He encouraged the students to set goals and take the necessary steps to achieve them.

Participants were instructed in essay writing via Skype by Ms. Karla Guilford, English instructor at Tidewater Community College in Norfolk, Virginia. Students practiced research techniques and learned to use graphic organizers to write an essay comparing and contrasting two colleges that they would consider attending. The winning essay, as determined by Ms. Guilford, will receive a Visa gift card. These students were also able to practice for the ACT Explore

taken by all eighth-graders in Alabama public schools.

High school participants experienced an equally productive week beginning with "Speak Up!," a public speaking session facilitated by Wallace Community College speech instructor, Ms. Shatangi Lane. Ms. Lane worked with the students on proper public speaking practices before assigning topics for them to demonstrate their oratorical skills. This group benefited from the instruction of Ms. Guilford as well. She also guided the ETS high school students in preparing essays that may be used to complete college and scholarship applications.

More About Talent Search Summer Enrichment

In addition to other activities, both middle and high school students had some similar experiences. Both groups participated in sessions called "Career Tech & Entrepreneurship" during which the participants explored the potential for success when a technical degree is combined with a great work ethic and sound business practices. In support of students operating at their best, they were introduced to *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens* by Sean Covey and took part in discussions and activities based on the book. To assist the students in applying the principles learned and to help them visualize their futures, they were guided in goal-setting activities during which they created vision boards. The students also acquired a bit of financial knowledge using the FDIC Money Smarts curriculum. Team building exercises and a tour of the Wallace Community College-Sparks Campus completed their enrichment week.

One of the highlights of the middle and high school Summer Enrichment was a community service project. Prior to attending Summer Enrichment, middle school participants received letters asking them to bring paper products to be donated to the Eufaula Day Care Center. Eufaula Day Care Center is a non-profit United Way agency whose mission is to provide safe, affordable, and quality child care for infants to preschool age children. During Summer Enrichment, participants attended workshops on the importance of being involved in community service for self-fulfillment and for applying for scholarships. As the culmination of this component, high school participants visited Eufaula Day Care Center to deliver the donated items and to do physical tasks that are normally paid for out of the center's budget or done by the staff.


TRiO Student Support Services Partners With Farmers Exchange Bank
