Talent Search Hosts Summer Enrichment

School is officially out and summer is here! TRiO Educational Talent Search held its annual Summer Enrichment program during the last two weeks of June. Eighty-seven middle school and high school students from Abbeville, Barbour County, and Eufaula public schools had a fun-filled learning experience during their two week engagement.

Opening session for middle school students began with an icebreaker for teambuilding. Students participated in an upbeat game called *Lollipop* in which the students interacted with their peers while establishing new relationships. Ms. Catherine Pierce led a session called Your Financial Future and shared helpful tips on budgeting. Ms. Priscilla Smith briefly touched on Financial Aid and steps to begin preparing for college while in middle school. Ms. Karla Miller conducted an informative lesson on how to write a successful business plan. Students brainstormed together to organize and implement new businesses that are needed in the Barbour County area.







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Mr. Wes Hall gave the group an unforgettable presentation. He is a radio personality, a motivational speaker, and the author of *You Are The Money*. He made his presence known when he began giving out money. From then on, the students were hanging on his every word and not missing a beat. Mr. Hall educated the students on how to secure the bag (get a job) through preparation, information, and self-development so they can begin building their own empire. His presentation was definitely an eye opener for many of the students.

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Community service is a very important part of the summer program. Ms. Tameka Owolabi, Director of Talent Search, is a big advocate for giving back to the community. This year students brought items such as toiletries, books, blankets, cross word puzzles, coloring books, and crayons to give to the residents at the Henry County Health and Rehabilitation Center in Abbeville, Alabama. The students decorated the boxes used to deliver the items. The students found that helping others gave them a sense of satisfaction that they had done something good for mankind.





To end the week, the students were able to unwind at the McWane **Science Center in** Birmingham, Alabama. The center offers hands-on science exhibits, an aquarium, and the IMAX **Dome theater. The students** excitedly explored the three-level facility from floor to floor. The aquarium had a small pool with fish and a sting ray, which they were able to touch. The students also watched a short movie at the Dome theater. It was great to have a little fun while learning at the same time.





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The high school students were eager to attend the summer enrichment program this year. The session began with learning to write a business plan with Mrs. Karla Miller followed by Financial Literacy and Career Exploration. Some of the instructors at Wallace Community College gave brief previews of their programs

to help students decide in which program of study they might be interested. Ms. Jennifer Matheny stopped by to discuss the benefits of dual enrollment. She explained the


process and encouraged participants to attend Wallace.
