


WCC Upward Bound Students Tour The Carter Center in Atlanta

On December 10, 2013, Upward Bound counselors Brittany Jones and Jertavia Lyman along with professional English tutor Elizabeth Oates led a group of ten Upward Bound students to The Carter Center in Atlanta, Georgia, to see how the organization uses technology to promote peace locally and internationally.

The trip began with a private tour of The Carter Center, an option not typically offered to the public. Lauren Kent-Delany, director of educational programs, invited students and staff into a conference room where she explained the democracy, human rights and health programs offered through The Carter Center. After her presentation, students were praised for their alertness and smart questions.

The Manager of Volunteers then led students through the circularly designed building pointing out President Jimmy Carter and wife Rosalynn's offices and headquarters along with donated pieces of art from well-known American artists such as Sam Maloof, LeRoy Neiman, and Andy Warhol. Once in the internship headquarters, the guide emphasized the necessity of writing well: "Applicants who cannot write an essay well, do not secure an internship with us. Writing well is essential for success."

One private tour led to another as Education Specialist Kahlil Chism guided the students through a




tour of the Carter Presidential Museum. He kept students' attention by highlighting facts that would otherwise be easily missed. When the students came to a replica of the oval office, Chism pointed to the President's desk, "Notice which direction the eagle's beak is pointing." The students looked and saw its head turned to the arrows in the eagle's claws. "Now look at the ceiling. What do you see that's different?" The eagle's head was turned towards the olive branches. This is just one example of many in the museum that show the Carters' belief that peace creates unity, not violence.

After dinner at the local Hard Rock Café that evening, students returned to the center where The Carter

Center President Dr. John Hardman and his wife, Laura, met them right before the start of the panel discussion "Using New Technology for Peace." Students sat with the couple in a designated area at the front of the room where they could clearly see the three panelists and moderator on the stage before them. Moderator Dr. John Stremmlau, vice president of The Carter Center peace programs, led designer and manager of the Carter Center China Program, Sean Ding; developer of the Syria Conflict Mapping project, Christopher McNaboe; and manager of the Center's ELMO initiative, Dr. Connie Moon Sehat, in a discussion about how new technological developments affect their work. During the question/answer time at the end of the program, one of Upward Bound's students, Brent Douglas, Jr., seized this opportunity to express his concern about the validity of their work: "You use technology to track other people's activity. Who keeps you accountable?" His question opened up a stream of discussion on fair practices and privacy.

The event showed students how close they are to a world outside of high school while still reminding them that a quality education is an essential part of them connecting to and impacting the world at large.

Jacksonville State University Fall 2014 Transfer Scholarships. Jacksonville State University has announced an expansion of the Presidential Scholarship Program for the graduating students of Wallace Community College beginning the 2014-15 academic year. This scholarship will pay in-state tuition costs for fall and spring up to twelve hours each semester. The scholarship is renewable for one additional year with continued academic progress at the 3.5 grade point average.
