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Talent Search Visits Campuses During 2018 Summer Enrichment










The TRiO Talent Search high school students traveled to Huntsville, Alabama where they toured Alabama A&M University and visited the U. S. Space and Rocket Center.

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Scholarships and Financial Aid Information

American Welding Society Foundation Scholarships. Since 1991, the AWS has helped students from around the world to realize their dreams and make them a reality. AWS Foundation scholarships help students with financial obligations such as tuition and fees, books and other supplies.

The E. L. Gibson Foundation Scholarships (External). The E. L. Gibson Foundation promotes better health for the residents of specific Wiregrass areas.
